Excitement gave a luster to the faces of children lined up to receive their scholarship awards and the pleasant anticipation in the room was almost tangible.

The dignitaries arrived and customary procedures concluded. The gathering stood up with a heavy heart, yet with pride, to remember and honour those who sacrificed their precious lives to let our country and her people be, forever free. Singing the National Anthem at my loudest, I surreptitiously looked around the packed room and was delighted to see everybody singing out loud with pride...as a Nation now free to breathe and live.

Then it was time to sit back and watch what unfolded on the screen...the beautiful foot steps that Sri Lanka Air Force Seva Vanitha Unit (SLAF SVU) left on the lives of men, women and children who are and will always be part of SLAF. SVU aims at supporting all Sri Lankan women with equality and focus on transcending all barriers. It strives to empower women to be part of the growth of the Nation and encourage them to accept responsibility as a component of that growth's engine. Working nationally, SVU has kicked off many novel projects under the guidance of its present Chairperson Mrs. Nelun Goonetilleke.
